

CCOP SUPPORTS THE "SFPD SAFE PLACE" PROGRAM



Castro Patrol has been a community leader in developing and deploying safety concepts and programs since our creation, and we are equally eager to support and contribute to effective and positive programs from partner groups and entities.

The **SFPD** "<u>SAFE PLACE</u>" program was first initiated as a project of the <u>SFPD</u> <u>LGBTQ+ Advisory Forum</u> of which CCOP is a member. The program encourages businesses to display the poster and provide a "safe haven" for victims of crime or harassment until police arrive.

We launched this effort in early July, chatting with thirty Castro businesses on the 500 block and on 19th Street. Our goal over the next month or so is to chat with ALL businesses in the neighborhood, and to see these posters in EVERY window.

We're quite short on Patrol volunteers right now, so it may take us some time, but we're committed to this important safety program.

WE'RE DISTIBUTING FREE SAFETY WHISTLES THROUGH PARTNERING BUSINESSES



As part of the "<u>SAFE PLACE</u>" program effort, we're also offering an additional safety aid by providing FREE safety whistles and a small display case for countertops.

The "WHISTLE FOR SAFETY" program has been around for decades and was promoted during Harvey Milk's time. Safety Whistles work well in attracting attention and causing possible assailants to back off. We resurrected the whistle program and have distributed over one-hundred thousand free whistles to date, but we still find many people who have never heard of the program and who don't carry a whistle at all times.

Collaborating with businesses who are displaying the "<u>SAFE PLACE</u>" posters, we will offer a small countertop display case and we will supply FREE safety whistles for your staff and customers to take as needed. We will replenish the whistles as often as needed.

- 1 BLOW means YES
- 2 BLOWS means NO
- 3 BLOWS repeated means SOS

Carry a safety whistle at ALL times.

07/20 SAFETY INFORMATION AT SF EAGLE FOLLOWING BATTERY INCIDENT



CCOP was asked to provide information and support to the leather community at the SF Eagle Bar in response to a patron who had been violently assaulted on a date.

CCOP Chief Carey, and CPS Chief Craig both attended and spoke at the wellattended safety meeting which included speakers from the Sisters of Perpetual Indulgence, the leather community, and the Guard community.

In addition to offer the immediate support and guidance requested, we are also in discussions with the various leather support groups to hopefully establish some selfdefense and other general training opportunities for their membership.

In response to this specific request, and recognizing that "Dating Safety" is an ongoing concern for our general community we also produced a safety guide poster which is included later in this newsletter. Feel free to print and display the poster in any location you feel it would be valuable.

07/20 SUNDAY CASTRO STROLL WAS A ROARING SUCCESS



With live music throughout the 400 and 500 block of Castro, artists working in real time, and vendor tables on the sidewalks, the Castro Stroll event on Sunday 07/20 was blessed with nice and sunny weather, comfortable temperatures, and a decent crowd.

The large live music band by the Castro Theater was particularly popular with many people stopping for a while to listen and even dance along with the musical numbers.

Encouraging patrons to return to the Castro and enjoy the neighborhood on a lazy Sunday afternoon is a great way to reenergize the neighborhood and bring more business and life into the area. Castro Patrol was very happy to participate in support of Castro Stroll by deploying three Patrol Volunteers for most of the event.

Castro Stroll is planned to take place regularly throughout the summer months, so watch out for the next one, and mark it in your calendar. Bring your loved ones along for a fun afternoon in the Castro. In collaboration with the SFPD LGBTQ+ Advisory Forum, CCOP is coordinating a public Hate Crimes meeting which will include a presentation from the US Attorney's Office, the FBI, the San Francisco District Attorney's Office and the San Francisco Police Department.

This will be the fourth such presentation we have collaborated on, to bring this important information to the public and our LGBTQ+ community. Many individuals are unsure or confused by the CA State and Federal Hate Crime statutes, how hate crimes are investigated and prosecuted, and even what constitutes a Hate Crime as opposed to a hate incident which does not rise to the level of a crime.

This meeting will help to clarify many of these things, as well as offering a questions and answers session to further clarify the legislation, the roles of each agency and department, and how they collaborate to ensure the most appropriate and successful prosecutions and convictions.

We are still finalizing the details for this important educational meeting. Keep an eye on our website and we will announce the date, time, and location once it is fixed.

PATROL TRAINING ACADEMY

COGNITIVE OVERLOAD

Fortunately, cognitive overload for CCOP Patrol volunteers is an extremely rare situation and indeed most of our volunteers will never encounter a situation or incident that rises to this level. Still, understanding what cognitive overload is, recognizing it in yourself and others when it presents, and making positive decisions to reduce the overload when it occurs is a vital safety skill to develop and hone.



The brain is the most complex organ in the

human body, autonomously controlling vital organ functions like the heart beating and breathing. It is an astonishingly effective and incredibly capable element of our existence and our well-being, processing hundreds of thousands of "inputs" and responding to them faster than the most advanced computer can manage at the moment. Despite all of this incredible speed and ability however, situations we find ourselves in from time to time may overload the capacity of the brain to receive, collate, categorize, assess, and respond effectively. There are many situations which may produce cognitive overload to varying degrees such as a number of people at an incident shouting information and instructions at the same time to you, or a very fluid and quickly changing situation which is too dynamic to fully comprehend and respond to.

Indicators that you, or someone on the patrol team, may be experiencing cognitive overload are: **Paralysis**, where you are unable to comprehend information or details being presented and essentially freeze; **Anger**, when you get irritated as the information you are receiving does not match your understanding or expectations and you do not know why; **Passivity**, by ceding your own decision making and simply accept another's directions as you cannot define your own. If you recognize these indicators in yourself or others, try to simplify the task or situation at hand. Withdraw from the situation, if possible, to provide time and distance to reassess and reevaluate.

Cognitive overload can lead to bad decisions and injuries. It is a factor in many serious accidents and is therefore worth time and attention to recognize and address it when present.

Castro Cares is a unique community collaborative providing supplemental outreach and hospitality services throughout the district to the city's homeless support services and the work of the San Francisco Police Department. The program is funded by a city grant and through public donations.

The program deploys uniformed Community Ambassadors 7-days a week. They interact with the residents, business employees and owners, visitors, and with those living on the streets.

Castro Community On Patrol (CCOP / Castro Patrol) seeks new volunteers to help us patrol the Castro neighborhood on a monthly basis. YOU could be our next Trainee Patroller!

We have successfully patrolled the Castro neighborhood since 2006, deploying in teams of three unpaid volunteer Patrollers who walk for a 3-hour shift which they select themselves. Our patrols provide assistance, distribute free safety whistles, offer guidance, and deliver support to the residents, businesses, and visitors of the Castro, interacting with thousands of people every year.

We are often "First Reporters" by calling in Medical, Fire, or Law Enforcement professionals when needed, and we will offer assistance when safe to do so until the professionals arrive.

Our volunteers are mostly members of the LGBTQ+ community, but we are open and welcoming to **ALL** who want to volunteer just three-hours a month to help keep the Castro neighborhood a little safer. We provide full training, and you will always deploy with experienced volunteers. Patrolling is fun, you get to meet lots of people, and you can feel good about helping out the community.
